'Betty Layman'

This Gartrell/Robin Hill azalea has large salmon flowers, blooming in late midseason. Parentage: 'Oakland' X 'Heiwa'. It grows wider than tall and is an excellent plant for the Philadelphia area. The Greater Philadelphia Chapter is currently propagating large numbers of 'Betty Layman,' named after Mary Elizabeth "Betts" Layman, beloved chapter leader who died in August 2012.

A hot topic in rhododendrons

October meeting takes on heat tolerance, and more

Did some of your young rhodos croak in the summer heat? Better come to the chapter meeting on Sunday, Oct. 13. Ron Rabideau, key man at RareFind Nursery and a hybridizer, will focus on heat tolerance and new introductions. For generations, rhododendrons have carried cold-hardiness information, but their performance at the other end of the thermometer is just as important, all the more so as warmer and warmer summers are recorded.

Ron's overall topic is new plants that RareFind is making available, including some future rhododendron introductions.

Ron was raised and educated in Massachusetts (B.S. in plant and soil science, University of Massachusetts), and moved to New Jersey in 1997, being hired by Hank

Schannen to manage RareFind's startup. He is a veteran of four plant-hunting expeditions, in China (twice), India and Siberia. His rhododendron hybrids include 'Absolute Citron', bright medium yellow with a blotch of red speckles.

The meeting begins at 1:30 with refreshments and conversation, with the program beginning at 2 p.m. For free admittance to Morris Arboretum, tell the person at the entrance kiosk you're attending the rhododendron meeting. It all takes places in the Widener Building at the top of the winding driveway.

The American Rhododendron Society is a horticultural organization devoted to the genus Rhododendron – which includes azaleas. At the national level, the society holds annual conferences, publishes the quarterly Journal of the ARS, and fosters plant research and conservation. Its website, www.rhododendron.org, is a trove.

Recent doings

The chapter had two successful sales in September. First was the annual Pants-for-Members offering of rooted cuttings and two-year-old granted propagations. A total of \$740 was taken in. (And kudos to all present, buyers included, for the efficient, speedy cleanup of the Widener Center, thus preventing a bridezilla encounter.)

A week later, under the leadership of Linda Hartnett, we operated a sales booth at the PHS Fall Festival at the Navy Yard. Gross proceeds were \$1,400, both from chapter plants and consignment material. Linda and Michael Mills each put in an 8-hour day, with help from Maris Ogg, Randy Dalton and Alice Horton.

To wind up the month, Maris led a exploratory meeting with representatives of other plant societies (daylily, iris, rock garden). Most of the groups face similar challenges. What can we learn from each other: how can we help each other? A followup meeting is anticipated.

Eponyms

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'Charlie Herbert'

Charlie Herbert himself made the cross, in 1970, but it was the Rahns, Clarence and Evelyn, who registered it in 1990. As described by Bob Huber, it has pink, "widely funnel campanulate" flowers, 17 per dome-shape truss, midseason, hardy to 0F. The parentage is 'Captain Jack' X R. degronianum ssp. yakushimanum Exbury form. Charlie was founding vice president of the Greater Philadelphia Chapter and its second president, before running off to Valley Forge.

'Marie Tietjens'

'Mount Siga' X 'Full Moon', registered by Max or Marie Tietjens in 1975. Strong purplish pink to strong purplish red at margins. According to Betts Layman, this was a case of rushing to name and register; a number of years on, Marie realized it wasn't the greatest plant. The cross was made by L. Bagoly of Strafford, Pa., in 1967. Marie was famed for her glass jar propagation technique in numerous Nearing frames in the Tietjens' garden in Blue Bell, Montgomery County.

'Maxine West'

A Robin Hill azalea hybridized by Robert Gartrell (1960) and registered by him in 1984. Parentage is 'Lady Louise' X ('Kaigetsu' x Gable's 'Carol'). The international Rhododendron Register describes it as irregularly double, pale purplish pink to very pale purple, light yellow green throat. Anecdotal information from Betts Layman is that there is a "white form" 'Maxine West' as well.

'Robert Huber'

The description, as published in the 2009 ARS Northeast Regional Conference sale catalogue, is "orchid pink flowers, with darker pink edges, spotting of Spanish orange; spherical trusses ... midseason; 4 ft.; -5F." The cross, 'Everchoice' X unknown, was made by one S. Everett (or Everitt) and registered by Charlie Herbert in 1979. The seed parent, while registered, is also mysterious – registered but with unknown parentage, though speculation is that it is a cross of two Dexters.

'Ruth Davis'

Ross Davis acquired a seedling of *R. degronianum* ssp. *yakushimanum* X *degronianum* ssp. *heptamerum* from Joe Gable and named it for his wife. In the old days we called it yak x metternichii, but then the taxonomists got busy. The flower is a typical apple-blossom yak affair – white with pink fading to pure white. The foliage is particularly handsome, dark glossy green with good indumentum. There is a tendency to some fall bloom; hardy to -10F.

'Schamanek's Glow'

Named for John Schamanek, former president of the Greater Philadelphia Chapter, this is a yak cross with fine dark green foliage and an appleblossom flower. Some fall bloom. It is one

The speaker's presentation – "Philadelphia's Gardening Heritage" – should have great appeal. In the 19th century, Philadelphia was at the forefront of American horticulture, with numerous nurseries producing the plants that became the backbones of Victorian gardens. Nicole Juday is a key figure in Awbury Arboretum's nascent Heritage Plants of Philadelphia project and will discuss Philadelphia garden history, Awbury's distinctive place in it, as well as the new Heritage Plants endeavor.

Nicole discovered a love of historic plants while working as horticulturist at Germantown's Wyck, which has the oldest rose garden in the U.S. Many plants later, she now writes and speaks frequently about old roses, antique plants, and garden history.

Keep on grafting

Anyone who purchased a grafted plant at the September Plantsfor-Members meeting was no doubt impressed with the size and robustness of the plant, just under two years from the simultaneous grafting-rooting deed. 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of many iterations of the cross R. degronianum ssp. yakushimanum X R. smirnowii.

'The Minahan'

Not many people get "the" in front of their name — The Honourable Jean Marie de Montague, The Pope, The Hunchback of Notre Dame. Dennis MacMullan is responsible for this cultivar, honoring Joe Minahan, hybridizer extraordinaire and trophy collector who lives in Camp Hill, Pa. Yellow, midseason. The parentage is ('Janet Blair' x 'Crest') X 'Yellow Balloon'.

'Theodore S. Stecki'

From the International Rhododendron Register and Fred Galle's encyclopedic *Azaleas*, we learn that this is a Linwood azalea, hybridized in 1970 and registered in 1984 by Al Reid, who worked with Charles Fisher in Linwood, N.J. The parentage is 'Nellie' X 'Opal', and it is hose-in-hose, doubled, vivid purplish red or deep purplish pink, depending on the source. The eponym, Ted Stecki, is former national ARS president, longtime leader of the Pine Barrens Chapter, and for many years the driving force behind the annual exhibit at the Philadelphia Flower Show.
