Saving Storm-Damaged Woody Plants

Most of us have cleaned up the broken limbs and downed trees. But we still have damaged branches and stubs where branches broke off. Normally, fall and winter pruning is not advised because it can delay plants going dormant. But if there is already a break, clean it by pruning away the damaged area now. Then do general pruning of healthy parts next spring before new growth starts.

Many rhododendrons that were crushed by fallen tree limbs have sprung back. However, broken branches will not recover and must be cut back. Also, check if the weight of snow and downed limbs uprooted any woody plants. If so, see if the plant can be uprighted and saved. If one-half to one-third of the original root system is still in the soil, with the remaining exposed roots compact and undisturbed, it might be possible to upright the plant and brace it with three or more lines to stakes.

Many studies have found that wound dressings are not necessary and can be harmful. However, if you have a crack that seems minor and you want to prevent it from getting worse, use grafting wax to facilitate mending of the crack and support the branch to prevent the crack from becoming worse.

Are You Going Peat-Less?

The use of peat has fostered many debates, but most gardeners still use peat or peat-based mixtures. Peat bogs lock up carbon, and each time a peat bog is harvested, carbon dioxide is released--a few acres of bog can release thousands of tons of carbon a year. The UK was targeted to be 90% peat-free by 2010, and the Royal Botanic Gardens at Kew, England, has been peat-free for some years now and had successes with peat-free mixes.

This country imports most of its peat from Canada, whereas a small amount comes from Michigan. Peat-free alternatives are available and have been displayed at the Philadelphia Flower Show, where Coir products, eco-friendly peat alternatives made from compressed coconut fiber were promoted. So, go "Green" and cut down on the use of peat. It will be healthier for you, who shouldn't be inhaling the dust from it anyway.
