On March 21 (Thursday) at 7:30 pm:

Karel Bernady: "Novel Technique of Grafting Rhododendrons"

Karel will share his personal experiences with a new grafting approach. Karel co-chairs the

Greater Philadelphia Chapters Plants and **Propagation Committee** with responsibility for the Chapter's Plants for Members Program. The Greater Philadelphia Chapter began its Plants for Members Program in 1986. When Karel was appointed to manage the program in 2003, he documented the propagation performance of the various cultivars attempted.

Experience over the last eight years with poor rootability of some plants and death of successfully rooted varieties during summer's heat caused Karel to consider grafting as a possible solution to these difficulties. In May 2010 Karel attended the International Rhododendron

Symposium in Bremen, Germany. At the Fredo Schröder Nursery, Timo Schröder

demonstrated in detail the grafting method used for elepidote rhododendrons, i.e. the simultaneous grafting and rooting of a scion/unrooted understock unit.

The nursery propagates 1.5 million elepidotes per year by the technique. Armed with information

Timo provided, Karel tried the method in November 2010 on thirty-one elepidote cultivars. The results were gratifying and he has further refined his technique. He will share the information learned and encourage us to try the technique to propagate troublesome elepidote rhododendrons.

He serves as Chairman of the Trustees of the Research Foundation and co-chairs the Research Committee of the ARS.

On April 18 (Thursday), 7:30 pm:

Herb Johns: "Companion Plants for Rhododendrons"

This informative presentation will take a look at plants that function well in the same conditions as rhododendrons and azaleas, that can be used to provide shade for rhododendrons and azaleas, can be intermingled with them, and can be planted under and



around them. Herb will bring about 30 perennials and woody plants that make good companions for rhododendrons and azaleas and discuss each of them. He also has a handout about these plants.

Herb and his wife Kay have operated **Point Phillip**

<u>Perennials</u> since 1996. It is about 15 miles north of Bethlehem, approximately 1 hour from Valley Forge.

Herb & Kay have been selling plants since 1996 - their oldest garden is 23 years old. The gardens at Point Phillip are predominately herbaceous perennials. They also use a variety of vines, shrubs, trees and ornamental grasses to help form the backbone of the gardens in which they display their perennials. Their pleasure in growing perennials is derived from the ongoing succession of bloom - from the earliest Euphorbia polychroma (Cushion Spurge) to the splendor of the fall grasses and mums

They do much of their own propagation. They grow a large variety of plants from seed every year and make cuttings from many of the plants in our gardens. They maintain two acres of display gardens at the nursery. In addition to providing other gardeners with ideas, these gardens are also used as a source of both seed and cutting material. The gardens are also used to display new plants that are being offered in the nursery. The gardens are their best sales tool. When a customer asks, "What does that look like?" We can often answer, "Would you like to see it in the garden?" Although they have been selling plants since 1996, they have been selling honey and related products since 1975.

Plant Labels are still available for Chapter Members

In cooperation with Jenkins Arboretum, plant labels are made for VF ARS members from January through March. If you have any questions, please contact Eva Jackson (noelevajackson@comcast.net). Labels will be made only for members and only for their own use. The sequence of orders processed will give priority to active members.

Quantity: 96 labels maximum per order/member.

Cost: \$20.00 for 1 to 96 labels, with check made out to Valley Forge Chapter, ARS, and money passed on to Jenkins.

Writing the information for labels:

Each line of a WP document becomes one plant label of one or two lines (your choice, depending also on how much info you want to have listed). If you want two lines, the lines must be separated by a semicolon (;) and no spaces. The lines must be single-spaced (for a total of 96 lines maximum).

Examples:

P.J.M.;(Weston) = 2 lines on plant label, no spaces before or after semicolon Girard's Pleasant White = 1 line on plant label **Notes**:

- 1) No line on the plant label can be longer than 26 characters (including spaces). If you have 2 lines, neither line can be longer than 26 characters (including spaces).
- 2) The format is yours, i.e., it may be 'P.J.M.' or just P.J.M. Plant names should not be

abbreviated.

3) Species names cannot be italicized by the engraving machine.

Checking label information: After you have prepared your list (as outlined above) and thoroughly checked/rechecked your own resources, you are encouraged, but not required, to send or e-mail your copy to Eva Jackson (noelevajackson@comcast.net) for a final check of spelling and other errors (yes they do creep in!). The copy will be returned to you promptly, with suggestions, if necessary, but you have the final say. However, it cannot be emphasized enough how important it is to check for accuracy of labels that cannot be corrected once engraved and that may pass on false information on numerous occasions (plant sales, flower/truss shows, cuttings exchanges, garden tours).

Engraving label information: The final plant list should be emailed to Harold Sweetman at: **Harold@jenkinsarboretum.org**, with 'metal plant labels' in the subject line. Labels are machine-engraved by a Jenkins Arboretum staff member onto large sheets.

Finishing labels: The engraved label sheets must be cut into individual labels, their corners rounded, and a hole punched for wiring. This job needs to be done by you at Jenkins Arboretum (with tools provided and as instructed). Wire for attaching label to plant is not provided.

2013 Rhododendrons of the Year Mid-Atlantic Region

Elepidote Rhododendron: Taurus



This is a spectacular early blooming red rhododendron. It is identical in parentage to 'Grace Seabrook' and they bloom a few days apart. Eventually becomes a large sized plant with pointed dark green leaves and dark maroon flower buds that make the plant a year-round asset. The 3.5 inch flowers are a spectacular dark red with black spotting. Few others rival its bloom in the early season. Afternoon sun protection is preferred. Grows to a typical height of about 6 ft. in 10 yrs. Cold hardy to -5°F (-21°C). Hybridized by Mossman. RHS Award of Garden Merit 1993.

Lepidote Rh.: R. mucronulatum 'Cornell Pink'



Unlike most other lepidotes, R. mucronulatum is fully deciduous, but compensates by being

one of the most cold-hardy. Very early April bloom, it covers itself with clear pink blooms before any leaves appear. Typical height: 5 ft. in 10 yrs. Plant is cold hardy to -20°F (-29°C). Raised by Skinner. RHS Award of Garden Merit 1993.

Evergreen Azalea: 'Rose Greeley'



Flower white with a yellowish-green blotch, hose-in-hose, widely funnel-shaped, wavy edged, 2-1/2" across, fragrant. Blooms early mid season. Plant has a dense, spreading habit. Grows to a height of 4 ft. in 10 yrs. Bud hardy to 5°F (-15°C). Hybridized by Gable.

Deciduous Azalea: R. schlippenbachii



'Royal' is an appropriate name for what many consider to be among the finest of deciduous azaleas. The distinctive, thin foliage will not tolerate excessive sun exposure. The dark green leaves turn crimson, orange or yellow in autumn. Grows to a height of about 4 ft. in 10

years. Plant and bud hardy to -20°F (-29°C). Native to Korea, North East Manchuria and Eastern Russia.

The above 4 rhododendrons selected for their adaptability in the Mid-Atlantic region of the United States have been awarded Rhododendron of the Year (ROY) honors for 2013. The purpose of the awards is to educate the public about the wide range of rhododendrons that can be grown successfully in people's gardens. To be selected for a ROY award a plant must have excellent foliage and flowers, have an attractive plant habit, prove itself hardy for the specific region and be pest and disease resistant.

New USDA Plant Hardiness Map

The 2012 USDA Plant Hardiness Zone Map is the standard by which gardeners and growers can determine which plants are most likely to survive and thrive at a location. The map is based on the average annual minimum winter temperature, divided into 10-degree F zones.

For the first time, the map is available as an interactive online map. Users may also simply type in a ZIP Code and find the hardiness zone for that area or view an entire state and use the color codes for the zones. The link is:

The previous USDA Hardiness map was published in 1990. On the 2012 map, areas in Pennsylvania are rated between ½ zone (5°F) to a full zone (10°F) warmer than on the 1990 map.

New Registrar Is A Local

Do you have a new hybrid that's just the best thing ever, with a fabulous name that everyone tells you should be "out there" for others to grow? Sounds like a matter of registration, and there's a new person in charge of registering American rhododendron names.

This past fall, Jay Murray, the longtime North American Registrar for the Genus Rhododendron, wound up her tenure and was succeeded by Michael Martin Mills of the Greater Philadelphia Chapter.

While the position is in the orbit of the national American Rhododendron Society, Michael actually reports to Dr. Alan C. Leslie of the Royal Horticultural Society. He is the top guy in the world for rhododendron registration, with four regional registrars (North America, Australia, Japan, New Zealand) under him. (Dr. Leslie is also the international dianthus registrar.)

At this early stage of his role as registrar, Michael is learning a lot of acronyms and arcane details about the overall international plant registration setup. Since registering a rhododendron requires precise measurements of actual flowers and matching color to the RHS color charts, there are precious few registrations being submitted at this time of year, but Michael reports feeling daunted by the prospect of opening his inbox in May and June.

After he's gone through a full year in his new role, Michael anticipates knowing enough to actually write something useful about the registration process. His advice for the time being is not to stint on the testing and trialing of a new rhododendron (hot years, wet years, cold years, different zones, ease of propagation) before seeking to register it.

Registration application forms, both downloadable and entirely electronic, are at the main ARS website, www.rhododendron.org/plantregistry.htm, along with instructions.

From A Guide for the Hungry Gardener: Fran Raughley's Rice Pudding

2 qt. milk ½ cup butter 1 cup sugar ½ cup raisins

½ cup rice

1 T. imitation vanilla or 1 tsp pure vanilla nutmeg, ground cloves, & cinnamon to sprinkle on top

Mix all ingredients except raisins and heat a little in sauce pan. Put in a 3 qt. casserole and put in 350° oven. Cook until brown on top (about 1 hour). Stir skim down and return to oven for ½ hour. Stir a second time and skim down.

In meantime soak raising in water. Add raising at second stirring. If not done, cook longer. Mix spices and sprinkle on top. Serves 8-10. May cut recipe in half for 4-5 servings.
