#### **Directions:**

Heading **South** on Route 1 (Baltimore Pike) from Rt. 476, toward Lima, look after about 7+ miles for a large Wawa store with gas station on the left, then turn left into Dougherty Blvd and again left into Ivy Lane (Fox Valley development, **which is hard to spot\***) Heading **North** on Route 1 (Baltimore Pike) from Rt. 202, turn right into Dougherty shortly past Richardson's Garden Center, and then left into Ivy Lane (don't miss it!).

\*Dawna and Lou plan to post signs and balloons at the entrance to their development. **Parking** is on the street or on a small dead end road just across from the house. Driveway to house is VERY steep, so wear sturdy shoes. Anyone who needs it can be dropped off at the bottom of the driveway.

#### Save The Azaleas at the U.S. National Arboretum

Some of you are aware of the plans of the **US National Arboretum (USNA) in Washington, DC**, to destroy their Glenn Dale Azalea hillside planting due to lack of funding. A massive response and political pressure led to the USNA's decision to suspend these plans—for now. Friends of the National Arboretum (FONA), a nonprofit organization, created an endowment to save the two threatened collections and have raised \$1 million so far but are casting a wide net to raise a second million by seeking at least \$10 from anyone who wishes to help assure the future of these collections. They appeal to plant society members, garden club members, and Arboretum visitors. The reality is that we have the power to save the Azalea and Boxwood Collections and, by acting now, to prevent problems in the future. For more information on how to help, go to savetheazaleas.org.
