Cut 3 or 4 large-leaf (elepidote) or 4-6 small-leaf (lepidote) cuttings, preferably early in the morning and low on the plants. Place in a plastic bag with a few drops of water. Named varieties only, please! Please label the bags with a waterproof marker or pencil and add, if possible, info about characteristics or parentage.

### 2:00 pm: Cuttings exchange/sale.

Cuttings are 25 cents a bag for everyone and are an easy and inexpensive way to increase one's collection of azaleas and rhododendrons.

# **2:30 pm: Plant Auction: Karel Bernady** Please **donate rhodies and azaleas,** as well as other garden-worthy plants that you feel others would like.

It will help the auctioneer and the bidder if you write a description of plants that you donate for auction. Having such info will make for lively bidding, especially for one-ofa-kind or special plants.

# The Unseen Garden by Wayne Guymon



Most of you remember Wayne and Doris Guymon's garden, WynEden, from the very rainy Cutting Exchange they hosted 2 years ago. WynEden gets lots of visitors between May and

the end of September, but only a few close friends and real garden addicts ever get to see the garden as it gradually declines and then slowly begins to revive again in late winter to early spring. Early on in his gardening career Wayne was intrigued by the idea of a garden for all seasons where there was always something of interest to see. As a result, he has spent a good deal of effort collecting and growing plants that give interest to the garden during the slow period of the year when the majority of garden enthusiasts are comfortably indoors perusing their garden catalogues. These plants are the central focus of this presentation which allows him to share with others the special magic and beauty of WynEden in winter, a mostly unseen garden.



Wayne Guymon was born and raised in Provo, Utah. He studied French at Columbia College in New York City and obtained his Masters and PhD from Columbia University

He lived for extended periods in Quebec Province, Paris, France, Crete, Honduras and Guatemala. Traveled frequently on business to the UK visiting all of the best gardens in England during his weekends there. Enjoyed vacationing in the Far East: Thailand, Bali, Hong Kong, China, & Cambodia

Wayne worked in the field of computing, eventually filling the role of a Divisional Chief Information Officer. He retired early in 2004 to garden full-time on his ten acre property in Chadds Ford called WynEden.



WynEden is open to the public by appointment and has been visited by numerous local and national garden associations as well as groups from England and Ireland. WynEden has been featured in The Green Scene, The Philadelphia Inquirer and Martha Stewart Living.

Wayne is a past President of the Delaware Valley Hosta Society and he is also an avid collector of Rhododendrons and Azaleas, currently raising over 7,000 of these in his garden at WynEden. He enjoys lecturing on the principles and philosophy of garden design. Besides gardening, he loves to read, travel and listen to classical music. He is also extremely fond of his dog, Nico, and, of course, his wife Doris.

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# Does American belong in the name of our International Society?

For people who are not USA citizens, does the name American Rhododendron Society hinder them from joining? That idea was brought up

at this years Spring ARS Board of Directors meeting in SeaTac, WA

The American Rhododendron Society started in 1944 in Portland, Oregon, and became incorporated in 1945. In 1949, the ARS expanded to include an "Eastern Division ARS" in New

York City. By 1951, there were also members from Canada, England, New Zealand, Scotland, and Sweden. In fact, the Royal Horticultural Society of England became a member. So the ARS became international very quickly.

In 1951, the system of local Chapters was established. In 1952 the first chapters were in California, Eugene, Middle Atlantic, New York, Portland, Seattle, and Tacoma. [The Greater Philadelphia Chapter was formed in 1957 and the Valley Forge Chapter in 1967.] Taday there are 66

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1967.] Today there are 66 chapters including chapters in 7 other countries: Canada, Denmark, Finland, Netherlands, Scotland, Sikkim, and Sweden. Besides these 7 countries, there are members in 24 other countries: Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Bahrain, Brazil, Czech Republic, France,

Germany, India, Japan, Korea, Latvia, Norway, Northern Ireland, New Zealand, Panama, Poland, Russian Federation, Switzerland, Thailand, Venezuela, South Africa, Spain, and United Kingdom. Of our 3,058 members, 475 are from Canada and 388 are from outside the USA and Canada.

The board did not vote on changing the name – there wasn't even a new name offered as a

motion. At this stage, the goal is to generate a wider discussion and see if there is sentiment to make such a change. One suggestion at the

board meeting was not to formally change the name, but to drop "American" from most promotion and literature, leaving the full, legal name for the fine print.

- The logo already states "Members Worldwide". Is that enough?
- American already encompass all of North, Central, and South America.
- IRS is not a very good moniker, the Internal Revenue Service already uses it.
- Would Rhododendron Society International(or Internationale) be better? [Internationale is a French left-wing anthem.]

Would removing American mean more people would be likely to join? Perhaps, but on the other hand, is this all academic since the ARS can't afford to create a new Journal name.

letterhead, mast heads, and to change legal documents such as licenses and registrations, etc.?

Your editor asked members from other countries about this issue and the majority said they saw no need for a name change. The president of the Finnish Chapter said he joined the ARS and actually wanted to be a member

of the American Rhododendron Society.


### 2013 Joint Philadelphia-Valley Forge ARS Flower Show -- May 12, 2013








## Genus Rhododendron: Five Major Groups





# How is an azalea different from a rhododendron? They are always in the Sugenus Tsustusi & Pentanthera







2. Azaleas are elepidotes and NEVER have scales.




3. The plants we think of as azaleas generally have fibe lobes to the flower unless they are double, but there are exceptions.



4. Most azaleas have one stamen for each lobe of the flower, while "rhododendrons" have two. Again exceptions exist.



5. Azaleas tend to have appressed hairs, hair that grows parallel to the surface of the leaf.





7. The hairs on an azalea never branch.

### The New Heat Tolerant Southgate Rhododendrons

Dr. John Thornton of Franklinton, LA, has released a collection of his hybrids of R. hyperythrum with popular hardy East Coast hybrid rhododendrons. The goal is to be able to raise have rhododendron hybrids that will grow is the Southeastern US and still be hardy in the Mid-Atlantic states. Dr. Thornton started this breeding effort in the early 1970s. These plants were trialed in the New Orleans area for several years. Dr. Thornton released his plants as trademarked plants through Southern Living Plants and wholesale production has begun. Besides being touted as heat-tolerant, they are being labeled as being hardy to -10F and for Zones 6 through 9

Southgate Brandi, 'Brandy Michelle Raley': 'Scintillation' x white form of R. hyperythrum. It has deep pink buds that open to pink, ruffled blooms with a dense habit and dark green, recurved, glossy leaves.

Southgate Breezy, 'Breezy': 'Janet Blair' x pink form R. hyperythrum. It has mediumpink buds that open to white with a prominent maroon blotch and a medium-dense habit with medium-green leaves.

Southgate Divine, 'Lisenne Rockefeller': 'Catalode' x R. hyperythrum. It has light-pink buds opening to white with purple specks and has a medium-dense habit with medium-green leaves.

Southgate Grace, 'Elizabeth Arden': 'English Roseum' x white form of R. hyperythrum. It has deep pink buds that open white, a dense habit and recurved leaves.





Southgate Radiance, 'Tyler Morris': 'Royal Purple' x R. hyperythrum. It has deep lavender buds that open to light purple and has a medium-dense habit.

All grow to 4 'tall by 5 'wide in 10 years, except Brandi grows to 3 'tall by 4 'wide. Grace grows to 4 feet tall by 6 feet wide in a decade.
