Speaker: Ken LeRoy

"Thomas Meehan: Father of Philadelphia Parks"

Ken LeRoy will talk about **Thomas Meehan** who was born in 1826 and was a noted British-born nurseryman, botanist, and author. He worked at Kew Gardens before moving to Germantown where he started a nursery. Meehan is considered to be the father of the urban park movement in Philadelphia. He campaigned to establish and preserve parks including Historic Bartram's Garden.

Ken LeRoy is an ISA certified arborist dedicated to integrating trees and plants into urban and suburban environments. Ken has cared for many trees, some of which have been trees of age on historic sites with stories to tell. He pursued his interest at Temple University's School of Horticulture and is currently an arborist representative with John B. Ward & Co. Arborists. Ken founded where one can photograph, document, and post impressive trees and shrubs in the Philadelphia area.



Speaker: Linda Eirhart: "Azaleas and Rhododendrons at Winterthur"

Linda Eirhart is the Director of Horticulture/Senior Curator of Plants at Winterthur Museum, Garden and Library.

H. F. du Pont corresponded with many of the rhododendron and azalea hybridizers of his time. Come see the hybrids in bloom and hear about the men who created these garden treasures.

Linda Eirhart will share some of the delightful correspondence between du Pont and these pioneer plantsmen.



There are thousands of azalea cultivars available today for the home gardener. That would not have been the case a hundred years ago when H. F. du Pont was just starting his "Wild Garden". In the early 20th century, H.F. du Pont began collecting and trying "just about every new evergreen azalea that became available."

For instance our Kurume azaleas that make up the main display in Azalea Woods were

first displayed in this country in 1915; two years later Mr. du Pont purchased several from Cottage Garden Nursery.

"Game of Rhododendron Jeopardy"



If you have skin in the game of gardening, protect your skin

We think of gardening and being outdoors as among the healthiest things we do. However, we need to be aware of some of the dangers. We know about bees and ticks, and about toxic chemicals and poison ivy, but they are only a few of the hazards we face.

Injuries in the garden are more common than you may think. By taking a few precautions, you can prevent many injuries due to gardening or yardwork.

9 ways to protect your skin while gardening

Dermatologists recommend the following while gardening:

- 1. **Cover up.** When working with plants, everything from the plant's sap to its thorns or spines can injure your skin. Touching certain plants can cause an allergic skin reaction. The best way to protect yourself is to cover your skin.
 - When working with plants, dermatologists recommend wearing:

- Gloves
- Shirt with long sleeves
- Pants
- Socks
- Shoes that cover your feet, such as running shoes

Dermatologists also recommend wearing a wide-brimmed hat and sunglasses while outdoors. This helps to protect you from the sun and the risk of skin cancer.

- 2. **Use sunscreen.** To protect your skin from the sun, you'll also want to apply sunscreen that offers:
 - Broad-spectrum protection
 - SPF 30 or higher
 - Water-resistance

Be sure to generously apply the sunscreen to all bare skin, including your face, neck, and ears. To protect your lips from the sun, use a lip balm with SPF 30 or higher. You can stay protected by re-applying sunscreen every 2 hours.

Covering up and using sunscreen can also help to reduce your risk of getting sunburn, skin cancer, and early signs of skin aging, including age spots and wrinkles.

3. **Avoid the sun when it's strongest.** The sun's rays are strongest between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. When possible, dermatologists recommend staying indoors during these hours

If you must garden during these hours, try to stay in the shade. This will also reduce your risk of heat stroke, heat rash, and skin cancer.

- 4. **Take precautions to avoid bug bites.** You can prevent many injuries and illnesses due to bugs by:
 - Spraying insect repellent with DEET on your clothing once you're outdoors
 - Avoiding gardening and yardwork during dawn and dusk, which is when bugs are most active
 - Flicking a bug off rather than killing it, which can prevent the bug from biting or stinging
 - Checking your skin from head to toe for ticks when you finish gardening, being

sure to check the skin between your toes, hairline, and underarms

5. Read labels on pest control products, plant foods, and fertilizers *before* using

them. Many gardening products that we use from insecticides to weed killers can cause injuries ranging from a mild rash to severe burns. In rare cases, people have developed life-threatening injuries.

Following all precautions on the label can help prevent these injuries. For example, when the label calls for a respirator, use one or don't use the product.

When using fertilizer, wear gloves. After using a fertilizer, immediately and thoroughly wash your hands.

- 6. **Avoid touching your face while gardening.** You could get plant sap or something else on your face, which might injure you.
 - If you need to wipe away sweat, keep a clean washcloth handy. Use it to blot your face dry.
- 7. **Treat wounds right away.** If you have a minor injury, such as a puncture wound from a thorn, it can be tempting to ignore it and keep working. Don't. Even a minor wound can become infected.

To prevent an infection, immediately treat your wound as follows:

- Wash the wound with soap and water.
- Apply an antibiotic ointment.
- Cover the wound with a bandage.
- Keep the wound clean by changing into clean gloves and clothing before you continue.
- Clean the wound and change the bandage every day until the wound heals.
- 8. **Skip foods and drinks that contain citrus or follow this precaution.** When citrus juice gets on your skin, it can react with sunlight and can cause a blistering rash or painful swelling. Foods that contain citrus include lemons, limes, grapefruit, and oranges.
- 9. Shower when you finish gardening and change into clean clothes. Sap, pollen, and other parts of plants can get on your clothes and skin. To protect your skin, shower and

put on clean clothes immediately after gardening.

Make sure you also machine wash the clothes that you wore while gardening before wearing them again.

When to see a board-certified dermatologist

While many skin problems caused by gardening can be prevented, an injury can still occur. You can treat most skin injuries at home by:

- Cleaning and caring for wounds right away.
- Treating itchy or irritated skin with a cortisone cream.
- Alleviating allergy symptoms, such as itchy eyes and sneezing, by taking an antihistamine.

If an injury doesn't heal or worsens, a board-certified dermatologist can help.

In May the Board of Directors at Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens announced the appointment of Tom Smarr as its new Executive Director. Tom succeeds Dr. Harold Sweetman, who grew the garden from the

ground up as Jenkins' Executive Director for 33 years.

Tom Smarr comes to
Jenkins with over two
decades of experience in
horticulture, conservation,
botanic gardens, public
parks and organic
landscaping. He holds a
master's degree in urban
horticulture from the
University of Washington
in Seattle, WA, and has
worked for established

institutions such as the University of Washington Botanic Gardens in Seattle, WA; New England Wild Flower Society's "Garden in the Woods" in Framingham, MA; the Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy Greenway in downtown Boston, MA; and the High Line, a public park in New York City along unused elevated train rails. Most recently, he led garden and natural areas design for The Parklands of Floyds Fork, a nearly 4,000-acre ribbon of parks in Louisville, KY opened in 2016 by 21st Century Parks, Inc.

Tom arrives at Jenkins during an important time of planning and growth: Jenkins is nearing an Endowment Campaign goal of \$20 million, is in the process of developing a new site master plan and continues to develop the botanical collections and educational offerings. Tom assumes his new role on June 24, 2019.

The 48-acres Jenkins Arboretum & Gardens which opened in 1976 showcases a world class collection of rhododendrons and azaleas. Jenkins is open daily and is always free of admission.

The weather couldn't have been better. We received many compliments on the Wine & Dine Garden Party at Jenkins, the evening at the Helicopter Museum, the plant sale, the hotel, the gardens, the lunches, the open bar, the banquet, the speakers, the items in the auctions, the phytosanitary inspections, shipping plants for people, and most of all, the friendly volunteers that made sure everyone had a good time.

Michael Martin Mills is finalizing the last jots and tittles of the convention finances, but basically the event broke even -- within less than \$100 of expenses = revenue. All four chapters have received reimbursement of the seed money supplied in 2017, \$1,500 per chapter.

Linda Hartnett did a masterful job handling registration, especially a number of last-minute changes in registration. A total of 235 registered. Of these, 212 were advance registrations, 13 were late registrations and an additional 10 registered but had to cancel because of family emergencies. Plant Sale: A massive plant sale with rhododendrons and companion plants will open Wednesday, April 29.
