### **Recipes**

"A Guide for the Hungry Gardener," a collection of favorite recipes and gardening hints published by the Chapter in 1984, is out of print and out of stock. The project was an effort to which men and women of area chapters contributed. Here are a few examples: **Gardening hints for June**:

- Acidifying may be done with ferrous sulfate at the rate of 1 pint per 100 sq. ft, or 1 tablespoon per gallon of water.
- Any newly rooted or acquired plants may be planted. (Some members prefer fall for planting of plants purchased in spring but keep them well watered—Ed.)
- Spray for borers now. One month later than previous spraying
- Make or buy flats for rooting cuttings. Be generous with a 4" height. Use cedar or treat other lumber with nontoxic Cuprinol (2% copper naphthenate). Most other preservatives are toxic to plants. (Cuttings will be plentiful at **the August Cuttings Exchange**—Ed.)

#### **Bourban Slush**

2 teabags, 1 cup boiling water, ½ cup sugar, 1 6-ounce can frozen orange juice concentrate, thawed; 3-1/2 cups cold water; ½ cup bourbon; ½ 6-ounce can frozen lemonade concentrate, thawed.

Steep teabags in boiling water for 2-3 minutes and then remove. Add sugar to dissolve and then remaining ingredients. Pour into freezer containers. When firm, spoon into cocktail glasses. Can be stored in freezer. Makes 1-1/2 quarts.

#### **Nut Torte**

3 egg whites; 1 cup sugar; 20 Ritz crackers, crushed; 1 cup walnuts or pecans, broken; 1 teaspoon baking powder; 1 teaspoon pure vanilla extract; heavy cream.

Make meringue of egg whites and sugar. Add other ingredients, except heavy cream, and bake in a 9-inch buttered (pie) pan in pre-heated 350-degree oven for 30 min. When cold, cover with slightly sweetened whipped cream and refrigerate overnight.

(The recipe for this versatile cake--it can be decorated in many different ways--was by the late Laura Suggs; Laura and her husband were long-time ARS members—Ed.)
